

CROOK COUNTY LIBRARY BOARD

November 2, 2016

Sundance Branch Library

The Crook County Library Board met on Wednesday, November 2, 2016 at the Sundance Branch Library. Board members present were Maylee Baron-Kanode, Paulie Jolley, Tami Baron, and Beth Kreuter. Unable to attend this meeting was Bob Smith, an excused absence. Employees present were Jill Mackey, County Library Director, Kim Heaster, Sundance Branch Librarian, Nancy Bowles, Hulett Branch Librarian, and Pam Jespersen, Moorcroft Branch Librarian.

The meeting was called to order by Chairwoman Maylee Baron-Kanode at 1:01 p.m. and began with the Pledge of Allegiance.

After introducing Melanie Wilmer, County Emergency Management Coordinator, it was asked that Melanie's presentation take place immediately since she had to attend a meeting with the County Commissioners. The amended agenda was then approved. Motion was made by Paulie and seconded by Tami. Motion carried.

Melanie was asked to be introduced and then introduced. Jill asked Melanie visit with us and review what emergency plans the County has in place and is putting in place. Jill also asked where the library fits into the plan and where library staff and patrons go in case of emergency. Melanie said the plan is a guide line and the documents are living documents and develop as the need arises and can change. Priorities for emergencies are life, property, and environment. Each building or facility in the county is unique and needs to develop its own plan. Each library is also unique and will need to work on an plan. The libraries should have a floor plan showing all the exits and evacuation routes. These should be posted at each entrance. How will the library property be restored if an emergency takes place? Is there a plan in place? Where will staff and patrons meet in an emergency evacuation? Think worst case scenario when developing a plan. Plans should be simple and flexible. Plans should be worked on collectively. These are the successful plans. What are goals of emergency planning? Does everyone know where the fire extinguishers are? Are drills done in each library? Does each library have supplies if people are sheltered within? There are many online trainings available to the public. Alerts for emergencies will come from dispatch, and people will be alerted by landline, text message, e-mail, etc. with a "Code Red" warning. Melanie will be meeting with each community to decide on where the emergency shelters are. Jill asked for the courthouse's plan. Melanie explained what the shelter trailer was and what is in it. Melanie provided several resources for developing a plan and she stated that FEMA provides many courses and resources available.

There was no correspondence.

Tami moved, and Paulie seconded a motion to accept the corrected meeting minutes from the regularly scheduled meeting from October 5, 2016. On the final page of the minutes WLS needed to be changed to WLA. Motion carried.

The checklist of expenditures was reviewed. Tami questioned the number of hours needed to paint the sheds. Jill explained that they are not quite done but the average was \$18.75 an hour which was the most reasonable of the bids she received. Beth moved and Paulie seconded a motion for approval of the checklist. Motion carried.

Jill then gave the treasurer's report. As of October 31, 2016, the adjusted checking balance was \$104,082.34. The current balance in checking is \$95,672.46. With the 1-year CD, the total operating funds was \$123,210.97. The total amount of the budget now expended is 30.51%, and \$30,195.08 from reserved funds was used. Paulie moved to accept the treasurer's report, and Beth seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Director's report for November 2016:

Meetings during the past month included the library board and foundation meetings, 2 commissioner sessions, weekly staff meetings at each library and a branch manager's meeting, weekly reading at assisted care and nursing home plus conversations with Wyoming State Librarian Jamie Markus. Still to complete the Annual Statistical Report for the state library and the equipment/furniture inventory of all 3 libraries. I was on vacation the last week of October. Coming up is the Holiday Bazaar in Sundance and Festival of the Trees, both fundraisers for the library foundation.

Building issues – The sheds were painted in Sundance and the new windows need to be recaulked – Randy and the commissioners are aware. Moorcroft – still waiting for new GFI outlet, tree removal, and new doors. Electrical wires were rerouted in Hulett. The Foundation received a \$2000 from the Vondriska family for an iPad kiosk in the Sundance Children's Section.

Looking ahead to next year's budget – info was released stating that sales & use tax collections for 2016 declined 20.9%.

At the Branch manager's meeting we worked on clearing up item types in the library system so we are consistent and reports will be easier to generate, discussed the new employee orientation checklist, and viewed a webinar on Makerspaces.

Hulett:

October 2016

Friends of the Library met on Oct 3. It was decided that during National F.O.L. week we would hold an Open House at the Library and each member was to bring a new member to sign up. The Open House was held on October 19th from 3-5 and we had 10 new members sign up.

Kierstan Basey from DTNP put on "Going Batty," a program about bats. 4 kids and 6 adults attended this program. She is hoping to do another one in January on snakes.

Book Discussion met on Oct 10th. The book, "Uglies" by Scott Westerfeld was discussed and the new book "Whiskey Beach" by Nora Roberts was handed out for next time.

Craig Goodell, the electrician was in on the 12th and moved wires & cords around, so there is no more on the floor.

We held a book sale at the Library on Oct. 11-14th. We did get rid of a few books.

For Teen Read Week, we had a Teen Pumpkin Decorating Contest with a \$25 prize. 3 Teens took pumpkins home to decorate and not one of them brought them back in.

Afternoon Craft was held on Oct 18th. We drilled pumpkins and painted wine bottles which were

decorated for Halloween. The interest is increasing each month.

The Cream Cheese Baking Contest was held on Oct 21. We had 11 entries and 14 people show up for the Tasting in the afternoon.

4 people joined us for the afternoon movie. We showed the movie, "Hello, My Name is Doris," and served popcorn.

Echo and Nancy are still working on weeding and inventorying. They both attended the WLA in Sundance on the 27th. Nancy also attended the Board Mtg on the 5th and the Branch Mgr mtg on the 17th.

In November, we will be exhibiting the Mercy Train Pictures, the UW Art Mobile will be here on the 3rd, Afternoon Craft on the 17th with a Thanksgiving craft, and afternoon movie on the 21st.

Youth news:

- Storytime is going well. For the Halloween party on October 26, there were 21 kids, 11 adults, and 5 babies. The kids listened to several Halloween books, did finger plays, and then had a blast with several games and the "spooky cave" before enjoying cookies provided by Ms. Moore's students. For this morning the theme was "Surrealism: Visions of the Mind" with the University of Wyoming Art Museum's Ann Simpson Artmobile. We had 13 kids, 6 adults, and 4 babies.
- The week of October 9 was Earth Science week and Wednesday, October 12 was National Fossil Day. Bonnie had geologist Deanna Stever as a special guest for Storytime that day. The Crook County Library was featured in the Wyoming State Geological Survey Geo-Notes Fall 2016 Newsletter.
- The 1000 Books Before Kindergarten is still going strong with new signups.

Adult news:

- November 8 is National Cappuccino day and we will be providing patrons with a cup of (instant) cappuccino.
- The Lunch Bunch reading group is meeting November 17. They are reading "The Power of One" by Bryce Courtenay.
- Feeders Readers book discussion group is meeting December 27. They are reading "The Known World" by Edward Jones.
- The Friends of the Library met on October 11. They had a great book sale and ended up with just over \$900. They will decorate the library on December 1, and plan to have new book cutouts for sale at the Festival of the Trees: "JOY", "PEACE", and "NOEL". These will be in addition to the "READ" and the special orders. Their next meeting is November 8.

Upcoming events:

- Rocky Courchaine will be doing a program on his dad who was a POW in WWII on November 18.

In other news:

- We were a zone host site for the 2016 WLA Conference on October 27. We made little goodie bags for all the attendees, had several door prizes, and gave out lots of swag provided by the State Library. We had all of our county public librarians here plus Twila Pilcher, Lara Coberly, and Christi Hampton (paras and school librarian from the Hulett and Upton schools), and Chris Van Burgh from the Wyoming State Library. We watched two live keynote speakers, Bob Beck from Wyoming Public Radio, and Gene Gagliano, an author from Buffalo and Wyoming's Poet Laureate. We had our choice from 16 pre-recorded videos and watched 7 of them. Chris also gave us a live overview of the

databases on gowld.net. We had a terrific lunch made for us by Jessica Neiman of the Amish Kitchen. It was a wonderful day of learning and networking. The State Library did an excellent job of setting this all up as an alternative to the conference in Jackson.

- Artmobile educator Erica Ramsey arrived here in Sundance on Monday afternoon and set everything up. We had 6 groups of students from the elementary and secondary schools (75 total) here for programs yesterday that started just after 8:00 and ended at 3:15. We also had numerous patrons walk through the display. Today we are having 5 groups of students (71 total) for programs in addition to the storytime this morning. Tomorrow the Artmobile will be in Hulett and on Friday it will be in Moorcroft.
- Bonnie received an iTunes card from Chris Van Burgh for purchasing apps on the iPad. Chris also gave an iTunes card to my daughter Shelby as an advance reward for participating in the upcoming Teen Video Challenge. This iTunes card was provided by Gale, and Chris' only stipulation was that Shelby mention the Gale databases in her video.

- On December 2nd the Foundation will be sponsoring a Christmas tree silent auction. Twenty trees have been purchased to be distributed to groups interested in decorating a tree for the silent auction. Discussion involved getting some live trees as well.
